Motive Power Certificate

(fourth in a series)

Given the continuing stream of new super-detailed diesels and steam engines which flow into our hobby each year, it would not be surprising if the amount of scratch building of locomotives continually decreases in direct proportion. The *Master Builder – Motive Power* certificate includes a requirement to scratch build a locomotive and that requirement may mean that this certificate is one of the hardest to earn. (Although I'd say that earning Association Volunteer certificate is much more time consuming!) Like the other certificates, the full requirements for this category are available on the web at http://www.nmra.org/.

Motive power refers to any type of steam, diesel, or electric locomotive, traction unit, maintenance vehicle, or other type of self-propelled vehicle that runs on track. That definition therefore includes everything from speeders and streetcars to the newest diesels. Not included are powered models of prototypes that were not powered (vehicles such as a powered hand cars) or unpowered models of prototypes which were powered.

The requirements for *Master Builder - Motive Power* follows the same general format as the other Master Builder certificates. To qualify for this certificate, you must build three models of railroad motive power. If desired, these models can be of different gauges and/or scales. They must meet the following criteria:

- 1. All of the models must be capable of self-propulsion.
- Each of the models must score at least 87½ points in an NMRA contest or under the AP Merit Judging program.
- Each of the models must be super-detailed with either commercial or scratch built parts.

4. In addition to being super-detailed, at least one of the three models must be scratch-built.

Currently, one of the favorite aspects of our hobby is kit-bashing/super-detailing diesel locomotives. Such a model, if it scores the minimum $87\frac{1}{2}$ points, would meet these requirements for two of the three required models.

To qualify as scratch built, the model must contain the following scratch built items:

- Steam locomotives Frame, boiler, cab, tender frame and body, and either valve gear or main or side driving rods.
- Other motive power Body, frame, cab, truck side frames, and pantograph or trolley poles if applicable.

Items such as the motor, gears, drivers or wheels, couplers, trucks, etc. are all excluded from the requirement for being scratch built. Note that the term "scratch built" implies that the modeler has done all of the necessary layout and fabrication that produces final dimensions, appearance, operating qualities of the model. This is a good statement of the intent and spirit of the "scratch built" requirement. Notice that it does not say that the use of a few commercial detail parts will disqualify the model as being "scratch built". In general, the same standard applies that is used in contest judging: "Completely Scratch built" means that 90% or more of the model was scratch built. (But you still need to scratch build the specific items listed above.) This means that in contest or merit judging, the model you are claiming as "scratch built" should have earned at least 11 points in that category out of a possible 15.

Once you complete these requirements, submit a Statement of Qualifications (SOQ) that identifies the models and the commercial parts used, etc. The easiest way to do this is to enter the model in a Divisional, Regional, or National modeling contest and simply attach a model contest form which includes this information and also documents your score.

If you are working on your AP certificates are want to ask questions or get encouragement from others doing the same,

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NMRA InfoNet News





Welcome to the second Post-Convention edition of the NMRA InfoNet News! This edition will contain all the Grand Rapids convention information that didn't make it into last month's edition, plus some other exciting news.

- After several years of work by incoming NMRA Secretary John Stevens, all U.S. Region boundaries are now defined by state and county boundaries, rather than zip codes. This will help keep boundaries stable as the U.S. Post Office continues to redefine its zip code areas.
- Michiana Division co-founder Jim Six, a college professor and experienced education expert, has agreed to lead a team charged with <u>developing a standardized clinic format</u> that will help ensure consistency and uniformity for clinics being made available to Divisions and Regions. The format will be based upon the one currently in use in the Michiana Division of the Midwest Region.
- Following the recommendation of Standards & Conformance Department head Didrik Voss, MMR, the Board directed that all eight DCC-related Recommended Practices now become NMRA Standards. Further, in the future the issuance of a Conformance Warrant is not to be influenced by Recommended Practices but will be based solely on adherence to applicable NMRA Standards.
- President Charlie Getz appointed outgoing president <u>Mike Brestel to replace Larry DeYoung</u>, who retired as publisher of *NMRA Magazine*. Charlie also announced that Mike has also agreed to serve as assistant to the president to ensure a smooth transition between administrations.

- Chief Financial Officer Frank Koch reported that the <u>attendance of the</u> <u>National Train Show in Grand Rapids</u> <u>was the fourth best ever</u>, and that <u>Saturday</u>'s attendance exceeded <u>Sacramento</u>'s of the same day. In addition, there were three more booths sold at Grand Rapids than Sacramento.
- Looking ahead to next year's convention in Atlanta, the "Peachtree Express" team reports that it's putting the finishing touches on a series of short videos featuring selected layouts that will be on tour during the convention. The videos will be posted to YouTube and will be able to be accessed from links on http://www.nmra2013.org/
- The Peachtree team is also proud to announce that there will be a number of <u>Civil War-related tours</u> – both railrelated and general interest – as well as a "Civil War track."
- And it's not too soon to be thinking about the <u>2014</u> convention! The <u>Cleveland Convention's website is now up</u> and running and taking registrations at <u>www.2014cleveland.org</u>.

The Flying Yankee

What is "The Flying Yankee"? As a Northerner and a casual train buff, I stumbled over some literature concerning the restoration of a diesel-powered streamliner built in 1935 for the Maine Central Railroad and the Boston and Maine Railroad by Budd Company and with mechanical and electrical equipment from Electro-Motive Corporation.

The streamliner was received in February, 1935 touring the Maine Central and Boston and Maine railroad system. In April the "Flying Yankee" was placed into regular service starting at Portland, Maine to Boston, MA returning to Portland followed by Bangor, Maine, back to Portland, then Boston and return to Portland. This 750 mile trip was done six days a week, Monday through Saturday. Sunday was a day for maintenance.

The Flying Yankee maintained service to the MEC/B&M system until its last run on May 7, 1957. The railroad donated the train set to the Edaville Railroad tourist / museum operation in Carver, Massachusetts. The train remained on static display there for about 40 years until it was moved in the early 1990s to Glen, New Hampshire after being purchased by the late Bob Morrell, former owner of Story Land.

In 1997, the train was moved to the Claremont Concord Railroad's shops in Claremont, New Hampshire for a complete restoration after being purchased by the State of New Hampshire. A restoration that is presently ongoing. As of 2004, the major structural restoration has been completed, and detailed restoration of components is proceeding. The eventual goal is to restore the train completely to running condition. The train was moved to Lincoln, New Hampshire, on August 10, 2005, to the Hobo Railroad where the mechanical restoration is taking place

Now where do I fit into this history lesson? Well, I had planned to go to Maine for a family reunion and enjoy the hometown Fourth of July celebration (the first in almost twelve years since moving down to NC). One of the goals in my once a year trip back to Maine had been meaning to visit something railroad related. But needing to visit my three children and five grandchildren always seems to take up what time I have in Maine.

Well, this trip was different. I told all my kids that I was going to ride some trains during this visit. Dad's wish list was going to get some checkmarks. Arriving Friday 29 June in 70 degree weather at Portland, ME I started my adventure while everyone in the Raleigh area was entering a series of 105 degree days. My first day was occupied with a trip to the Wiscasset, Waterville and Farmington Narrow Gauge Railroad. But, that is another story to be told later.

The Flying Yankee was a very interesting adventure. We arrived early Saturday morning at 8:00 AM, after a two hour drive from Old Orchard Beach, ME before anything opened in Lincoln, New Hampshire. I spent my time eating breakfast at MacDonald's and then going over to the Hobo Railroad Station where we waited until the station opened at 10:00. The Hobo RR was celebrating its 25th anniversary season. I went directly to the Flying Yankee storage location. The cocoon was still around the three car set.


