Cutting Rail

The question of how to cut rail using Xuron rail cutting tools comes up periodically.

For maximum cutting life and optimal finish, HO track should be cut top to bottom, N and Z cut from side to side.

The note below is from the Xuron web site.

A favorite of model railroaders worldwide. Xuron's Micro-Shear® cutting action leaves clean square cuts on both brass and nickel silver track - sizes HO, N and Z. For best results, position track in the center of the jaws (top to bottom).

But then watch closely Cody Grivno in the video below. He cuts HO track side to side.

Master Model Railroader Certificate

(Fourteenth in a series)

In previous articles, we have discussed the various certificates which can be awarded under the NMRA Achievement Program. In this issue, I want to instead discuss the goal of the program which is qualification as a *Master Model Railroader*. This honor is bestowed after a modeler has met the qualifications for a minimum of seven certificates out of the total of eleven AP certificates. Of the seven certificates, you must have received one from each of four areas:

- Railroad Equipment
 Master Builder Motive Power
 Master Builder Cars
- Railroad Scenery
 Master Builder Structures
 Master Builder Scenery
 Master Builder Prototype Models
- Railroad Construction and Operation Model Railroad Engineer - Civil Model Railroad Engineer - Electrical Chief Dispatcher
- Service to the Hobby and NMRA Member

Association Official Association Volunteer Model Railroad Author

As can be recognized by this requirement, the goal of the AP program is to encourage modelers to become proficient in many different areas. You must be able to prove (through the awarding of various AP certificates) that you have the ability to build quality scale models, scenery and/or structures and construct, wire, or operate a layout as well as provide service to the hobby.

I have always been an advocate for the AP program because it challenges you to improve your skills and, in the process, get more out of the hobby. Maybe there is an aspect of the hobby that you just don't enjoy, such as electrical wiring of a layout. You can still

participate in the hobby. However, if electrical work is a challenge that you want to master, you can use the AP program as a way of confronting that possible lack of knowledge and learning more about it. In the process, you can both improve your skills and complete the requirements for an AP certificate.

As I travel around the NMRA I hear a common theme rumbling at Division and Region levels: "How do we attract more members to the NMRA?" Sure, there are variations on this theme, like "What's 'National' doing to attract new members," or "What tools do we have to attract new members," but the underlying theme doesn't change. We need new members if the organization is to survive. That job is for each of us.

This discussion came up awhile back at a Region convention, where I had been asked to comment after the banquet. The term used was "After-Banquet Speaker," which is generally not a good idea around me, because I can talk about the benefits of the NMRA for a long time. Relic From Times Past

Frequently, when I'm driving down a rural road, I will come across a building that is structurally sound but appears to have been abandoned. Many times, the original purpose of the building is not obvious and I have often wondered why it was simply left to decay.

When I finally got around to building the Northeastern kit made available through the Sierra Division, I decided to have it represent one of those relics from times past. I also wanted to try some new coloring and weathering techniques as a part of the process.

Assembly followed the kit instructions except for the following modifications:

- Internal bracing using 1/8" stripwood to prevent warping;
- Rafter tails added to the underside of the roof sections;

- Foundation trim boards to hide the edges of the floor at the bottom of the clapboard siding;
- 2"X 6" decking and trim added to loading platforms;
- Rolled red asphalt roofing material from Stoney Creek Designs; and,
- A couple of detail parts from my stash.

The coloring and weathering was accomplished through a layering process that began by treating both sides of the kit parts with Campbell Tie Stain. This product is no longer available, but I have a couple of cans from long ago. Any dark solvent stain could be substituted. The parts were placed in wax paper, inserted between two sheets of plate glass, weighted and then allowed to dry completely.

The foundation was created by applying multiple thick coats of Gesso, allowing each to dry and then finally lightly carving with a dental pick to give a rougher texture. Coloration was Floquil Concrete with some white and a touch of black added.

The walls and trim pieces of the structure were "colored" with a variety of pastel pencils while still in the flat. The basic color was an ivory white and was used to achieve coverage of 80-90%. This gave the feeling of peeling paint. If you look at the photographs closely, you will see a number of other colors (yellows, oranges, dark blue, dark brown and dark gray) that were then randomly applied. Darker colors were used closer to ground level. A blending stump was used to eliminate obvious dividing lines. A number of well-known modelers have used this technique and I really like it. Next time I think I'll try to make the colors just a bit softer, but I'm still very pleased with my first effort.

For the platform decking and the foundation trim, I used Com-Art weathering solutions randomly applied to different boards. No two boards were done the same. I've found that more realistic effects can be obtained by layering different colors/solutions over each other. Counting the Com-Art solutions and the Hunterline solutions used to weather the roofing material, I must now have at least 10 different brands and home-made mixtures in my

collection. I use them randomly and often intermix brands, but am always careful to test for compatibility. The Hunterline stains are available in 12-15 different shadings, including some that are not available in other brands.

The roofing material was applied in the normal fashion, but with an interesting effect. Sometime ago, I acquired the Carl brand rotary trimmer pictured for the purpose of cutting delicate papers and corrugated materials, and it works very well. One of the blades I purchased is called a "Heckler" pattern and it gives a look of random wear on edges. I used that blade to make the edge cuts of some of the Stoney Creek rolled roofing material. From a normal viewing distance, I very much like the effect.

Weathering the roof involved several products. Floquil Weathering Paste (a discontinued product) was first applied randomly over the rolled roofing in a dry-brush manner. (I believe the same effect could be accomplished by simple dry-brushing with a tan or light beige.) This helped dull and lighten the basic color of the roofing. Hunterline stains were then applied in a variety of colors. This was very much a stopand-go process. Stain was applied, allowed to dry, the effect evaluated and then the process was repeated with yet other colors. There were probably a dozen different applications over the course of a couple modeling sessions.

It had been at least six months since I had last built a structure and the process of creating this little structure reminded me how satisfying it could be. Jump in, build something and enjoy!












































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Meeting Minutes
